Meet the Book Mongers

They've donated books and cash for phone cards!

A dynamic duo of book lovers known as The Book Mongers pick up thousands of books in Washington and Oregon, from libraries, bookstores, thrift stores, and estates, and donate many of them to non-profits, schools, art programs, Little Free Libraries and used books stores. Some are sold to recoup operating costs. They also hold a monthly "Buck-a-Book" sales event at their warehouse in Tukwila, WA. They hope to go fully non-profit soon.

Their generous hearts share half of the proceeds with various partners, including AIDNW. In July, the Book Mongers donated \$480 to AIDNW which was used to purchase phone cards for Tacoma immigrant detainees. In addition to their monetary donation, AIDNW receives about 10 boxes of books and many jigsaw puzzles (which are in great demand by detainees) monthly. As of August, we've received 1,628 books and 158 jigsaw puzzles from The Book Mongers, including 653 foreign language titles, which are also in great demand.

Addie Bogart and Amanda Thompson are The Book Mongers, with the twofold mission of fostering a culture of literacy and community engagement by gathering and redistributing books, and rescuing literary treasures from the fate of landfills. A 2012 National Wildlife Federation Report stated that an estimated 640,000 tons of books--roughly 320 million books--reach landfills annually.

Several AIDNW volunteers have helped The Book Mongers prepare for their sales event (great fun!) and more volunteers are always welcome. The bonus for a few hours of work is to keep any book treasures you might enjoy, as you sort through hundreds on a variety of topics: fiction, non-fiction, sci-fi, DYI, children's, and best sellers. Last year, AIDNW's Book Program donated over 2,000 books to immigrant detainees, due mainly to the efforts of volunteer Nanette R. The goal for 2024 was 4500 books, and this was nearly reached as of August. These is due in large part to both The Book Mongers and to the Tacoma Public Library, which provides 1,200 books annually. AIDNW's Book Program continues its mission and will focus on getting more foreign language books (paperbacks only), jigsaw puzzles, and blank composition books (with no metal bindings). To donate any of these, you may drop them off at the Welcome Center between 3 and 5 pm weekdays.





Hospitality House News

Volunteer Steve Sarwono has been working with Hospitality House guests, taking those who have been granted asylum to DSHS to apply for benefits. He took one guest there by bus, so that he could learn the route. That man was later able to help a new guest get to DSHS. They applied for food stamps, Refugee Cash Assistance (RCA) and an ORCA card, then walked to the DOL to get a Washington State ID.

There have been several recent challenges. One Iranian guest failed his eye exam at DOL. He claimed that he couldn't see anything. Steve thought he may not have put his head far enough into the machine. DOL staff said he would have to see an optometrist. The guest tried going to a different DOL office, but the note about the optometrist had been entered into the computer system. He ended up paying \$49 for an eye exam after Steve located an optometrist who would accept Apple Health coverage. The guest passed the eye exam, and was then able to get his Washington Driver's License.

Another guest had to have his Afghan driver's license mailed out from Afghanistan when his passport and blue ICE ID were not enough to get him a Washington ID.

One guest bought a car with the help of a friend who co-signed for an auto loan. The interest rate was high but he had no other choice. He uses the car to go to work and deliver Uber Eats on the side. Many insurance carriers won't insure people who have no US driving or credit record. Luckily, Steve found a broker who was able to provide insurance and even waived a \$25 agency fee. He did have to pay two months' premium in advance. Steve notes that language barriers can make it easier for people to be taken

advantage of, though.

Steve noticed that one Afghan guest had been going to the airport for job interviews in jeans and a casual looking shirt. Steve gave him a long-sleeved shirt and a pair of slacks. He asks that if you have any long sleeve shirts and business pants for men, to coordinate with Aidan and bring them to Hospitality House. The guest did get a call back and job offer after an interview with a company that cleans airplane cabins, but ended up taking a different job in Kent.


